**AN ACT TO AMEND AND RE-NUMBER § 51102(h)(11) OF CHAPTER 51, TITLE 17, TO AMEND § 51103(b)(4) OF CHAPTER 51, TITLE 17, AND TO AMEND § 7120 OF CHAPTER 7, TITLE 22, ALL OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO AUTHORIZING THE TEMPORARY CERTIFICATION OF PEACE OFFICERS AND TO AUTHORIZING THE MANPOWER DEVELOPMENT FUND FOR CERTIFICATION COURSES REQUIRED BY THE PEACE OFFICER STANDARDS AND TRAINING COMMISSION.**

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

**Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that in addition to implementing compensation adjustments and providing for a safe and conducive work environment, public safety and law enforcement agencies of the Government of Guam must also position themselves to recruit and retain individuals to serve as peace officers by improving Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Commission (Commission) certification policies.

Based on information provided to the Committee on Public Safety, Emergency Management, and Guam National Guard, *I Liheslatura* finds that criminal justice graduates of the University of Guam (UOG) who desire to establish a career in public safety and law enforcement, but lack certain training requirements including, and not limited to, First Responder/First Aid, Emergency Vehicle

1 Operator Course (EVOC), Officer Survival and Use of Force, Firearms and safety,  
2 Criminal Investigations, and Dynamics of Substance Abuse, do not qualify nor are  
3 they offered temporary employment options. Despite having completed  
4 undergraduate degree requirements for potential employment in management and  
5 administrative positions at the Department of Corrections, Customs and Quarantine  
6 Agency of Guam, or the Judiciary of Guam, criminal justice graduates are left to  
7 either seek employment elsewhere or delay their public service career – and the  
8 opportunity to earn a salary and benefits – while they complete POST Commission  
9 requirements at their expense.

10 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further finds that the POST Commission statute and  
11 corresponding sections under the Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations allow  
12 the Commission to grant temporary certification of peace officers who have  
13 previously completed basic peace officer training but have since left service in good  
14 standing, provided that these peace officers shall satisfy standards and training  
15 requirements as set by the Commission. These same policies also permit the  
16 temporary certification of peace officers from other jurisdictions who have  
17 completed basic peace officer training and have since left service in good standing.

18 Recognizing the time and resources that are invested by criminal justice  
19 graduates to earn their college degree, and the overlapping of public safety and law  
20 enforcement principles and practices that are taught through UOG and POST  
21 Commission certified training programs, *I Liheslatura* proposes to authorize the  
22 POST Commission to grant temporary peace officer certification for those who  
23 possess a degree in criminal justice or equivalent area of study and who are in good  
24 standing, provided they satisfy the standards and training requirements as set by the  
25 Commission.

26 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further intends through this Act to authorize the Guam  
27 Department of Labor and the Guam Community College to expend a portion of their

1 Manpower Development Fund appropriations for costs associated with training  
2 individuals who are granted temporary peace officer certification by the POST  
3 Commission.

4 **Section 2.** § 51102(h)(11) of Chapter 51, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, is  
5 *amended and re-numbered*, to read as follows:

6 “(11) ~~establish supervisory, managerial, and executive level standards~~  
7 ~~and certification for the agencies covered by this Chapter~~ provide by rule for  
8 the temporary certification of peace officers who possess a degree in criminal  
9 justice or equivalent area of study as determined by the Commission, and who  
10 are in good standing, provided that said peace officers satisfy standards and  
11 training requirements as set by the Commission. The Commission shall  
12 require applicants to complete any remaining certification requirements  
13 within six (6) months of temporary certification. The Commission is further  
14 authorized to establish policies to recoup tuition, fees, and other government-  
15 funded expenses in the event an employee resigns, transfers, or fails to meet  
16 any service or repayment requirements;

17 ~~(11) (12)~~ establish supervisory, managerial, and executive level  
18 standards and certification for the agencies covered by this Chapter; and

19 ~~(12) (13)~~ may enter into professional developments with the Guam  
20 Community College, the University of Guam, or another suitable institution.”

21 **Section 3.** § 51103(b)(4) of Chapter 51, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, is  
22 *amended* to read as follows:

23 “(b) With the approval of the Commission, the Executive Director  
24 shall:

- 25 (1) certify Peace Officer Training programs or institutions;  
26 (2) certify peace officers who have satisfactorily completed  
27 training;

1           (3) consult and cooperate with peace officer training  
2           academies in the development of basic and continuing education  
3           training programs for peace officers;

4           (4) consult and cooperate with the Guam Community College,  
5           the University of Guam, the Guam Department of Labor, other  
6           institutions of higher education, or any POST certified advanced  
7           training programs for the development of specialized courses of study  
8           on Guam for peace officers in the areas of police science, police  
9           administration, the social sciences and other related areas including, but  
10          are not limited to, First Responder/First Aid, Emergency Vehicle  
11          Operator Course (EVOC), Officer Survival and Use of Force, Firearms  
12          and safety, Criminal Investigations, and Dynamics of Substance  
13          Abuse;”

14          **Section 4.** § 7120 of Chapter 7, Title 22, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended*  
15          to read as follows:

16                 **“§ 7120.     Manpower Development Fund.**

17                 (a) There is hereby created in the Guam Department of Labor, a  
18                 Manpower Development Fund (MDF), which shall remain separate and apart  
19                 from any other funds of the government of Guam.

20                 (b) The MDF is created solely for the purpose of receiving territorial,  
21                 federal, and private money and revenue from registration fees on non-  
22                 immigrant temporary workers.

23                 (1) Thirty percent (30%) of the annual revenues generated  
24                 shall be allocated to the Guam Department of Labor. The Department  
25                 of Labor allocation in the MDF shall be expended exclusively to fund  
26                 the following:

1 (A) One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) shall be  
2 allocated annually to produce the quarterly "Unemployment  
3 Situation on Guam" report and any other reports relating to labor  
4 statistics;

5 (B) legal services in the field of employment and labor  
6 law, human resources, or administrative law;

7 (C) workforce development and training programs  
8 including, but are not limited to, courses required for certification  
9 by the Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission as  
10 provided for in 17 GCA Chapter 51; and

11 (D) the remaining balance of the Department of Labor's  
12 MDF allocation shall be used for administrative and operational  
13 purposes as may be determined by the Director of Labor.

14 (2) Seventy percent (70%) of the annual revenues generated  
15 shall be allocated to the Apprenticeship Training Program at the Guam  
16 Community College, with the primary intent to develop the workforce  
17 for positions that have been approved for non-immigrant temporary  
18 workers. The Guam Community College allocation in the MDF shall  
19 be paid out by the Treasurer of Guam to the Apprenticeship Training  
20 Program at Guam Community College, and shall be expended  
21 exclusively to fund the following:

22 (A) direct financial assistance to students enrolled in the  
23 apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship program which may  
24 include, but are not limited to, courses required for certification  
25 by the Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission as  
26 provided for in 17 GCA Chapter 51, who may not qualify for the  
27 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), such as the

1 Pell Grant. Any unused portion of the allocation under this  
2 Subsection shall be returned to the MDF;

3 (B) the administrative and instructional costs for the  
4 operation of the apprenticeship training programs;

5 (C) facility upgrade and equipment relative to the  
6 apprenticeship training programs, and pre apprenticeship  
7 training programs with the Guam Department of Education; and

8 (D) the advertising and outreach programs for the  
9 promotion of the apprenticeship training programs.

10 (3) Annual Audit of the Manpower Development Fund. The  
11 Public Auditor shall conduct an annual audit of the Manpower  
12 Development Fund to ensure compliance with all statutory regulations  
13 governing its deposits and expenditures. The cost of such audit shall be  
14 paid by the Manpower Development Fund. (c) The MDF shall not be  
15 used for any purposes other than those enumerated in this Section, and  
16 shall be subject to legislative appropriation.”

17 **Section 5. Effective Date.** The provisions of this Act shall be effective upon  
18 enactment.
